



It is the first time that this Polish production - designed and directed by Italian Roberto Lagana Manoli - was staged outside Warsaw. It had its premiere in Warsaw in 2005. "In Warsaw, we usually have ten premieres during the season and this means ten times someone is working on the music and libretto to put across new ideas," notes Chelmecki.

He describes Aida as a colourful opera... "It is full of life; the cast is fantastic," he says, describing the classical element of the opera. However, he is quick to point out that there are, at present, two attitudes to opera: classic and modern - it is about modern interpretations. "There are people who want new operas, but most prefer classical operas. There is an element of scepticism with the new language of opera...," he adds.

ABOUT AIDA

Giuseppe Verdi's Aida is said to have been commissioned partly for a Middle Eastern audience and was staged at Cairo's Khedive Opera House. It is a story of a bitter love triangle, involving Aida, an Ethiopian slave, Amneris, an Egyptian princess and Radames, an Egyptian army general. Presented against a backdrop of war and cultural oppression, the opera narrates the tale of conflicting loyalties and forbidden passion. Radames falls in love with Aida, but is torn between his love for her and his loyalty to the Pharaoh.

The love triangle is formed when the Pharaoh's daughter Amneris falls in love with Radames; it is unrequited love, as he has no feelings for her. Both Radames and Aida are in a dilemma – they have to make a choice between their love for each other and their native land.
